
# We believe in the power of water

#### Supporting climate resiliency

## Creating climate resilience through sustainable solutions

Water is the primary way in which we will feel many of the effects of climate change. Access to sustainable safe water and improved sanitation solutions can support climate resiliency for the people who need it the most.

Saphia lives in a region in Kenya where the adverse effects of climate change, like drought, impact the ability of farmers to sustain their crops and livestock.

Saphia found the solution to his family's water crisis after meeting with Family Bank, one of Water.org's local partner banks in Kenya. With the funds from a small loan, Saphia hired local contractors to drill a new, deeper well on his property.

To ensure his well could operate despite the weather or season, he also used some of the money from the loan to install a solar panel. The solar panel powers the well pump, which now pumps water into storage tanks that hold enough water supply for Saphia and his family to access year-round.

# Water changes her world and changes her story

Empowering women is critical to solving the global water crisis, as they are often responsible for collecting the water their families need to survive. When women in poverty have access to safe water at home, they can create the life they choose for themselves and their families.

Selamah spent years walking from her home in Indonesia to a river to collect water. She stored the water in buckets and used it to care for and cook for her family. She also used the water to wash the vegetables she sold at the market. Because of her many needs for water, trips to and from the river were frequent and exhausting. This way of getting water was not safe or sustainable.

Thanks to donors like you, Selamah was able to solve her water crisis. She now has a water tap on her property from which she can draw safe water for her family and business.

## Access to safe water protects and saves lives

Access to safe water and sanitation contributes to improved health, helps prevent the spread of infectious disease, and reduces child and maternal mortality rates. Now more than ever, access to safe water is critical to the health of families around the world — families like Thai's in Cambodia.

Each morning, Thai walked to a river to collect water for drinking, cooking, laundry, and bathing. He often repeated this task multiple times a day, leaving work to retrieve the water his family needed to survive. He did this to protect his pregnant wife's health and his daughter Maya's safety. Unfortunately, Thai could not control the quality of the water he brought home, and it often made them sick.

Thai learned he could take out a loan through Phillip Bank, one of Water.org's local partner banks in Cambodia. He used the loan to obtain a safe water connection and build a bathroom. Thai and his growing family now have lasting access to safe water at home and the health that flows from it.

# Safe water helps break the cycle of poverty

Because you take the time to give, people in need have time to earn income that will help their family break the cycle of poverty — women like Sapdiah in Indonesia.

"I wanted to have clean water at home, but we didn't have the money."

Surviving on less than \$3 per day, families like Sapdiah's lack access to critical resources needed to help them break the cycle of poverty — resources like safe water.

Now with safe water at home comes more time, choices, and opportunity. Sapdiah no longer spends hours a day walking to and from the river outside her village in Indonesia to collect water. Instead she uses that time to roll more palm fibers to sell, and in doing this, Sapdiah has increased her household income. Lasting access to safe water at home gives her time and the opportunity to break the cycle of poverty.

## Ruth can read


Millions of families around the world lack access to two of the most critical resources to get their kids to school — safe water and a toilet at home. Having the time and health to go to school starts with access to safe water.

Rosalina used a small, affordable loan through our partner bank in Peru to connect her property to her local water line. This connection means her daughter Ruth will never know the water crisis like her mother once did. Now, instead of walking to collect water in the morning, Rosalina can walk Ruth to school where she can read her favorite books and look ahead to a bright future.




